Place-Based Environmental Education

Continuing as a trendsetter and resource for Christian Colleges and Universities

Au Sable finished its 35th year teaching undergraduate students in environmental studies, serving 122 students from 29 colleges. Students completed 187 total courses in the 23 courses offered at the Great Lakes, Pacific Rim, Costa Rica, and India campuses during January, May, and two Summer Sessions

(see table on right). Additionally, seven students earned eleven Au Sable certificates during their studies this year.

Au Sable welcomed Redeemer University College (Ontario) as a member of its Sustaining Partners. New partner-based tuition reductions helped six Redeemer students to be able to study at the Institute in 2013 (see complete list of Sustaining Partner institutions on right).



With the support of two alumni and many friends grateful for his life and mentorship, Au Sable established the annual Harold Snyder Fellowship for students with a similar passion and vocational calling as its founder.

Field courses continue to deliver hands-on learning that convey environmental



knowledge, skills, and ethics in a supportive, Christian community. Students gave high marks (1-5 scale; 1 low, 5 high) for value of experience (4.8), level of accomplishment through courses (4.5), expressing the Institute mission through its programs (4.8), and overall experience (4.8).

Training environmental education practitioners to teach the next generation

Au Sable completed its 36th year of outreach to local schools through its Environmental Education Internship Program (EEIP), training 9 interns in environmental education to deliver place-based,

environmental education to 2,003 local school students. The Environmental Education Program initiated a new Citizen Science Program to engage local citizens and schools in collecting meaningful data for environmental protection. The new effort began through a start-up grant from the Michigan Clean Water Corps (MiCorps), where local community members will be trained to monitor and collect data to help protect the Upper Manistee River. Another new program, Adopt-a-Class, garners local community

support to fund environmental education in their schools by helping them attend Au Sable programs. The ÉEIP also hosted numerous local events, including the annual MiCorps conference, an aquatic invasive species workshop, and its 4th annual Butterfly Day with new 5K fun run.

Direct Scientific Investigation of the Natural World

Advancing scientific knowledge and serving the local community through research

Entering its seventh summer of undergraduate research, Au Sable partnered with local non-profit organizations and government agencies to provide seven students with applied research projects in ecological restoration and conservation.

David Petry (Bethel University; top middle photo, on right), Casey Shoaff (Cornerstone University; top middle photo, on left), Christian Hayes (Cedarville University; top right-hand photo), Joel Betts (Calvin College; bottom right-hand photo, on left), and Nathan Hadley (Wheaton College; bottom right-hand photo, on right) continued a six-year study on the recovery of stream biota following dam removal on the Boardman River for the Conservation Resource Alliance and Trout Unlimited.

Kesley Piepkorn (Bethel University; left-hand photo) continued a three-year study of the genetic differences in two physically identical species of the invasive grass, Phragmites, and the effectiveness of different control methods for this species using a combination of molecular and restoration ecology techniques with her research benefitting the Grand Traverse Conservation District, Grand Traverse

Regional Land Conservancy, and the Watershed Center.

Kendra Antonides (Calvin College; bottom middle photo) studied the relationship between sculpin abundance and stream quality to explore the potential for management agencies to use sculpin as an indicator species for high quality aquatic habitat.

Sharing the Christian Call to Care for the Earth

Spreading the principles of earthkeeping in higher education

Au Sable hosted meetings, events, and conferences throughout the year to help strengthen the ability of Christians in higher education to integrate the Christian call to serve, protect, and restore God's earth throughout their departments, courses, research, and lives.

Au Sable hosted a Missionary Earthkeeping Conference for 32 faculty program directors of international development and missions majors at 23 colleges to explore how to integrate courses in environmental sustainability into their interdisciplinary curricula in conjunction with the Calvin College Faith and International Development Conference. Speakers included Laura Meitzner Yoder (Merry Lea Environmental Learning Center, Goshen College), Bill Deutsch (Global Water Watch, Auburn University; see photo on bottom left), Scott Sabin (Plant with Purpose), David Unander (Eastern University), David Warners (Calvin College), Ronald Oakerson (Houghton College), and Grace Ju Miller (Indiana-Wesleyan University).

The Au Sable Graduate Fellows explored 'creation and the cross' with Dr. Loren Wilkinson at their annual January 2013 conference at the Great Lakes Campus. Twenty-three fellows from five chapters attended the conference. Dr. Wilkinson, Professor of Interdisciplinary Studies & Philosophy at Regent



College and editor of Earthkeeping in the Nineties: Stewardship of Creation, led the graduate fellows in discussion on how the centrality of the cross in Christian life relates to the service, protection, and redemption of creation.

The Au Sable Academic Council (see top photo) brought 26 faculty from participating colleges to help guide the Institute and participate in professional development to strengthen environmental programs in Christian higher education, learning how to 1) create "Systems of Success" in environmental programs at Christian colleges and incorporate their critical elements and goals; 2) develop systems of personal effectiveness for students and faculty in the study of creation care, and 3) foster systems of successful collaboration with Au Sable that maximize effectiveness and accomplishment for faculty and students.





Creating Community for a Flourishing Earth

Building connections to strengthen the Christian environmental community

Au Sable supported 34 Christian graduate students studying in environmental fields in furthering their understanding of Christian environment stewardship in their academic work and vocational calling (see middle row photos). The Au Sable Graduate Fellows has grown to a community of 34 fellows at 10 universities: seven chapters at Cornell University, University of Michigan, Michigan State University, University of Minnesota, Ohio State University, Princeton Seminary, and University of Wisconsin-Madison as well as individual fellows at University of California-Berkeley, Purdue University, and University of Illinois-Chicago.

Au Sable also began two new alumni support programs. The first annual Au Sable Alumni and Friends reunion brought 75 alumni and friends to reconnect with the Institute and Au Sable fields over mid-August weekend (see photo, top right). Participants enjoyed guided field trips, Au Sable service projects, and a cookout to honor the 37 years of service from its Director of Support Services, Bob Barr (see photo, middle row on left). Au Sable also initiated a new professional mentorship program called the Au Sable Professional Network (ASPN), where alumni can contact 30 Christian environmental professionals for professional guidance in fields as diverse as scientific illustration, wildlife conservation, and environmental policy and organizations as diverse as non-profit organizations, government agencies, and private businesses.

Retreat and conference participants were welcomed by the new Au Sable Gateway to Au Sable's 120 acre campus (see photo, second from left on bottom). The Institute hosted ten retreats for church and college groups, pastors, local professionals, and Au Sable faculty representatives.

With its third consecutive year of budget surplus, Au Sable purchased a new trailer and motor for its pontoon boat, renovated the pontoon boat and the Au Sable dock on Big Twin Lake, and purchased a used Toyota 4Runner to be used primarily for its research studies.




